I'm looking forward to spring 2024 with great anticipation. After last year's long and hardworking summer of yard transformation, covering over four thousand square foot of grass with thick layers of cardboard and mulch, and growing oodles of zinnias, the time is coming. Waiting in my cold, damp soil is an amazing assortment of native perennial wildflowers seeds. They're going through the all-important process of stratification. These winter-sown seeds were carefully selected to serve as both nectar and host plants for the anticipated butterflies.

I'm new to Marshall and the Marshall Area Garden Club. But, I'm not new to gardening. My name is Lynn Sleight and I'm the proud caretaker of Grma Lynn's Butterfly Garden on the corner of Marshall Ave and Fair Street. I'm an avid reader. Douglas Tallamy is my go-to author for growing native plants. Tallamy also has numerous inspirational YouTube videos. Check it out.

I expect that the upcoming spring will involve lots of time staring at the ground, waiting for the tiny seedlings to push their way through the soil. But, I also know that native perennials are slow growers. There probably won't be too many perennial flowers this year, just the tender green leaves. In time, two or three years, I'll see the rewards of my work. The flowers will bloom. The butterflies will come.
