READY FOR GARDEN TOUR?

- Garden Previews: Know your garden preview time. You should have received a postcard with both your garden preview and shift times as well as an e-mail with schedules and instructions. The garden preview is when the garden owner can answer questions and identify unique plants and features that may get a lot of questions. Please attend if you can and please only attend the garden preview where you are working.
- Shift Times: Know your shift time. Please put your garden/shift time in your calendar so you don't forget. Your complimentary ticket to the tour, for working a tour shift, will be in the garden's ticket box or you can get it at your garden preview.
- Refreshments: Please help with baked goods/snacks.
 Drop off your cookies/snacks Fri 6pm-9pm or Sat 7am-9am to Robin
 and Mike Holcomb at 406 High Street. Cookies/snacks should be
 individually bagged or prepackaged and nothing that will melt, like
 chocolate. Having some gluten free options was also very much
 appreciated last year. Avoid nuts due to possible allergies.
- Tickets: (Adult, Kids and Online) Tour tickets on the day of the tour are \$15-adults, kids 12 and under are free and get a treasure map. Only cash or check payment on the day of the tour. Online tickets should be picked up at the Ticket Booth. If someone shows you an online voucher at the garden, give them a ticket, record their name and let the Ticket Booth know they've received their ticket. Instructions will also be in the ticket box at each garden.
- Ticket Booth: (Location Change) Remember that the ticket booth is now across the fountain circle in front of the Town Hall/ Welcome Center. Only cash or check payment that weekend.

Lynn: The Community Garden at Marshall United Methodist Church (MUMC) is open to the public, and they would love to have you involved! It is located just beyond the main parking lot at MUMC.

A fantastic group of church and community members have been working on this new project. The raised beds were built by Boy Scouts in Troop 373 and are now in place. Weed barrier was installed, cardboard and mulch have



been laid down. The beds are loaded up with all the base compost layers. Seedlings grown by our own FFA high school students have been planted. An irrigation trench has been excavated, making it easier to water the plants. A garden shed was built by Boy Scouts in Troop 373 and the space for the shed has been prepped. Soon a deer fence will be installed around the garden.
